#### **BEAUTIFICATION OF SALVATORIAN FOUNDER**

Last weekend the beautification of Salvatorian Founder, Fr Francis Mary of the Cross Jordan took place in Rome. Over the last 20 years the Salvatorians have led our community.

#### Extract from the Parish Bulletin

Fr Francis Jordan was born John Baptist Jordan on 16th June 1848 in Germany. He was known to spend much time in private prayer, and his time as a painter and decorator showed him the vast material and spiritual needs of the people. After his ordination in 1878 he had thoughts of uniting all Catholics to spread and defend the faith. His vision was for a society of clergy, religious and laity working together for this mission.

The pre-Vatican II Church, however, was not ready for this and encouraged him to start a religious order instead. Therefore, on 8th December 1881 three priests, including Fr Jordan, made their vows to what we now know as the Society of the Divine Saviour. Exactly 7 years later the congregation of sisters was founded. Fr Jordan died on 8th September 1918.

Today, spread over more than 40 countries, there are over 3000 Salvatorians who work through a number of apostolates such as parishes, pastoral care, aged care, youth work and as missionaries. Through this work the vision of Fr Francis Jordan is becoming more and more of a reality. In 2020 Pope Francis set the date for Francis Jordan's long awaited beatification, 15th May 2021. Salvatorians worldwide will be united more

than ever despite being physically apart. In Australia, NSW Salvatorians will celebrate a thanksgiving Mass for the beatification with their local Bishop, Most Rev Anthony Randazzo, on 18th June. This will be followed by an Australian celebration in Perth with Archbishop Timothy Costelloe on 8th September.

These celebrations will also commemorate the 60th anniversary of the Australian Region and the 140th Anniversary of the Salvatorian Order and further strengthen the bond of the Salvatorian family

## Canteen update

Thanks to all of our wonderful volunteers who ensure both canteens have been open each and every week this term. Attached is the most recent roster – please contact Louise on 0407 100 433 or comment on 'Our Kids Canteen' Facebook page if you can help out.

We are trialling **Gluten Free sausage rolls**, so please if you have a gluten free child, we welcome your feedback with new menu items. We are currently looking at options that will increase our capacity on the primary canteen.

A few questions you may need answering.....

- What happens if my child is sick and I have ordered a canteen lunch?
- If you order lunch for your child/children and they are unwell on the day. Contact the office before 9am if they are not attending school and we will arrange for a cash refund to be sent to your child's classroom the next school day

If you pick your child up from school during the day – please understand that we have already catered for your child, therefore a refund is not available

• What happens if something is missing from my child's lunch order or I have ordered lunch and they have not received it?

Please understand that sometimes items get missed – this happens more regularly with large orders or when children order a variety of different food. We are completely volunteer run and packing lunches for the whole school sometimes gets a little crazy. If your child recognises that they are missing an item – please advise them to

- a) tell their teacher if they are in infants
- or b) come to the canteen and talk to the volunteers if in primary
- Keep your child's details up to date on QKR if your child is listed as being in kindergarten, but they are actually in year 5 this makes it quite hard for us to get their lunch to them.
- Order under the appropriate side Infants Menus if your child is in infants and Primary Menus if your child is in primary. If you have a child on each side – please check you have ordered from the right canteen for each child.
- Order by the cut-off time and that you receive a receipt this assists us if your child presents at the canteen and tells us they do not have any lunch and their parents/carers ordered them a lunch order.

We found an unusual plant that the Indigenous used for super glue, I got poked a few times by that!

They named it the grass tree which grew 1cm a year and used the spike as a spear because could float.

That was my adventure and everything had different textures and now I know a lot extra.

Muogamarra, a place that many species of animals and plants live in, that aren't in Sydney. For example, for years when there were bushfires the trees will gain ash on their bark, which Aboriginal people would spread on their faces and body like paint. Also the sandstone rocks they find, they use to make different paints like red, orange and a rare pink.

They would eat things like the nectar from banksia, but when the banksia is soft they use it as toilet paper, but if it is spikey they use it as a comb.

Aboriginal people would find nuts in the wild. But a specific nut has poison in it. But the Aboriginal people knew how to get rid of it, by peeling off the shell, crushing it up then putting it in a string basket to put in a stream of water, They used small gum nuts on stick sticks to brush their teeth.

Strangely, there was a plough that convicts probably used. The Convict was located at Muogamarra as well. The convicts had used the rock that mined to create a ledge.

Also they had a kangaroo arving that pointed to the women's site. Those wonders of Muogamarra.
