Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time Year B Solemnity of the Assumption August 15, 2021

Today's solemnity celebrates Mary's Assumption into heaven. It is one of three feasts of Mary that are Holy Days of Obligation for Catholics across the world. January 1 is the feast of Mary, the Mother of God, and December 8 is the feast of the Immaculate Conception of Mary. The assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary into heaven has long been held as an important Catholic belief. The belief was not defined as dogma, however, until 1950 by Pope Pius XII. The dogma teaches that Mary, who was without sin, was taken, body and soul, into the glory of heaven.

The tradition that Mary, at the close of her life on earth, was assumed into heaven does not rest upon anything disclosed in the New Testament. We will look in vain, then, for any suggestion of it in the readings. What we do have, especially in the Gospel, is a scriptural indication that the ancient tradition concerning her Assumption has a certain appropriateness in view of what *is* said of Mary in Scripture.

The Gospel for this holy day (Luke 1:39-56) recalls Mary's actions after the announcement of Jesus' birth by the Angel Gabriel. Mary



goes to visit her cousin Elizabeth who is also with child. Elizabeth greets Mary with full recognition of the roles they and their unborn children will play in God's plan for salvation. Mary responds to Elizabeth's greeting with her song of praise, *the Magnificat*. Both women recall and echo God's history of showing favour upon the people of Israel. Mary's Magnificat, echoes the song of praise offered by Hannah, the mother of Samuel (1Samuel 2:1-10). It is within this Scripture that we are introduced and can embrace the Marian prayer of our tradition *'The Hail Mary'*.

The Gospel for this day reminds us that Mary's Assumption into heaven is best understood with regard for the full spectrum of Catholic beliefs about the person of Christ and the person of Mary. Only Mary, who was born without stain of original sin—the Immaculate Conception—could give birth to Christ, who is fully God and fully human. This is called the Immaculate Conception. Because of Mary's role in God's plan of salvation, she does not suffer from the effects of sin, which are death and decay. Mary is the first to receive the fullness of the redemption that her son has won for all of humanity. The Church, therefore, recognises Mary as the sign of the salvation promised to all, the channel through which all the blessings of salvation will flow into the world.

The Gospel writer Luke spotlights Mary's faith, which enabled her to recognise the work of God in her people's history and in her own life. Her openness to God allowed God to work through her so that salvation might come to all. Mary is a model and symbol of the Church. May we be like Mary, open and cooperative in God's plan of salvation. Source

World Humanitarian Day 19 August

#TheHumanRace

"World Humanitarian Day recognizes those who dedicate their lives to serving others in difficult circumstances," according to Catholic Relief Services. Perhaps no one did this better than Saint Teresa of Calcutta, "she didn't just send people out – she did the work herself...We felt we were in the presence of a saint."

#TheHumanRace is a global challenge for climate action in solidarity with the people who need it most A climate emergency is wreaking havoc across the world at a scale that people on the front lines and in the humanitarian community cannot manage. Time is already running out for the world's most vulnerable people — those who have contributed least to the global climate emergency yet are hit the hardest — and millions of others that are already losing their homes, their livelihoods, and their lives.

With most climate campaigns focused on slowing climate change and securing the planet's future, World Humanitarian Day 2021, will highlight the immediate consequences of the climate emergency for the world's most vulnerable people and ensure that their voices are heard, and their needs top the agenda at the UN Climate Change Conference (COP26) in November.

Background

This day was designated in memory of the 19 August 2003 bomb attack on the Canal Hotel in Baghdad, Iraq, killing 22 people, including the chief humanitarian in Iraq, Sergio Vieira de Mello.

In 2009, the United Nations General Assembly formalized the day as World Humanitarian Day (WHD). Each year, WHD focuses on a theme, bringing together partners from across the humanitarian system to advocate for the survival, well-being and dignity of people affected by crises, and for the safety and security of aid workers.

This year, we highlight the immediate human cost of the climate crisis by pressuring world leaders to take meaningful climate action for the world's most vulnerable people.


AROUND OUR SCHOOL COMMUNITY


