Dear Parents and Carers,

As this will be our last newsletter for the term, I hope that you are all travelling reasonably well considering our current circumstances.

With the news yesterday that the lockdown restrictions for the Central Coast will remain in place as the restrictions for Greater Sydney, we will be following the same guidelines for returning to school next term.

School resumes on Tuesday 5th October and will continue to be open only for those children of essential workers. While school is open for parents who need the service, can I remind you that all families are strongly encouraged to keep their children at home where possible, and to restrict movement as requested by the NSW Government. Parents will be asked to continue to complete the google form for attendance next term.

Returning to School

At present the roadmap for schools to return starts on Monday 25th October for Kindergarten and Year 1 students only. Years 2 and 6 students are due to return on 1st November and Years 3, 4 and 5 on 8th November. At present we do not know exactly what this will look like. Whether all students will return on the dates indicated or if this will be a staggered re-entry to school. Once we have this information, I will pass it on.

Symptoms

Can I please remind everyone, that if your child is displaying any COVID like symptoms (fever, cough, runny nose, sore throat etc), that they should be tested and remain at home until a negative result is sent through. This result needs to be emailed to the school before returning. The same applies to any immediate family members (parents or sibling), children should be kept at home until a negative result is returned.

If family member who is classified as a close contact, all family members should be tested and not return to school until negative results are returned. All close contacts do have to remain in isolation for 14 days. Close contacts need to have another COVID test. Casual contacts need to be tested and should not return until a negative result is returned. You do not have to isolate for 14 days.

Uniforms

Term 4 is usually the term we begin to return in our Summer Uniforms. Can I suggest that parents begin contact [ALINTA](http://www.alintaapparel.com.au/alinta/) now, to ensure that any uniform items needed, will arrive to you in time for the beginning of the school term. By the time we begin to return to school all students should be in their full summer uniform.

Thank you to Mrs Kerry Power

Mrs Power will be returning to her usual position in CSBB at the end of this term. It has been wonderful having Mrs Power as part of our staff this term as the Acting REC while Ms Bolton has been at OLR Wyoming as the Acting AP. Thank you Mrs Power for helping us this term and for your contributions to our school and parish community.

We also welcome back Ms Fiona Bolton to school and while we hope she enjoyed her stay at OLR Wyoming, we are looking forward to her returning to St Patrick's next term as our REC and co-Yr 4 teacher.

I hope that all our families can have a restful back over the up-coming holidays. Thank you for your continued support during this very difficult term, especially to all those families who kept their children at home when they could.

I know that all of us at school are exhausted so you must all be too. Last day of term is Friday 17 September.

'You are the Christ!'**Commentary:**

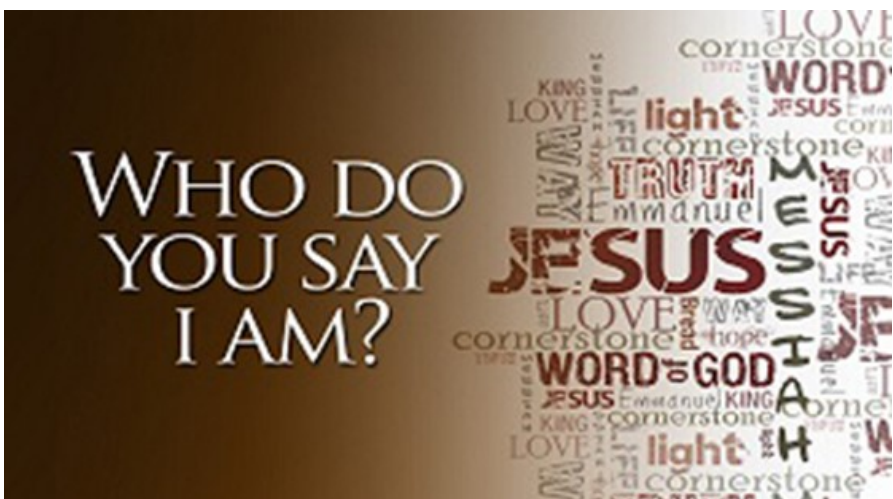
Today's gospel reading comes from a pivotal point in the Gospel of Mark ([Mark 8:27-35](#)). Up until this point, we have seen Jesus perform many miracles and heard Him teach many things.

All along, the people have been amazed and sometimes scandalized by what Jesus was doing. But the question remained, who is He? In today's reading, Jesus confronted His followers about this very question. He

first asked them what people thought of Him. Their response indicates that the popular opinion about Jesus was that He was a prophet, but nothing more. This is not too different from the popular opinion about Jesus today. Most people in our society think that Jesus was a good man who taught many good things and is a good example to follow. But they would not go beyond that. Jesus, to most people, is just another religious figure who we can learn from, in a line of many other good people throughout history. But Jesus' identity is not determined by popular opinion. And Jesus did not leave it at that with His followers. He then asked, "But who do you say that I am?" He is also asking each of us this question. It is, in fact, the most important question.

The identity of Jesus is the hinge on which our lives pivot. Will you open the door of faith and acknowledge Jesus as Lord? Or will you close the door and choose to live contrary to His plan for you? If Jesus is merely another good man with some good moral and religious teachings, then to reject Him and His teachings doesn't really matter. But if Jesus is who He said He is—that is, if He is God in the flesh—then to reject Him is to reject God, who created and sustains us. Jesus invites us to believe in Him and then put that faith into action. To follow Jesus does not mean our lives will be easy or comfortable, for Jesus said, "Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me." But the way of the cross, of following Jesus as the Messiah and Lord of our lives, is truly the most fulfilling way to live. And, best of all, it leads us to salvation and eternal life.

Dear Fathers, Deacons and friends

With great sadness, I share with you that Fr James Duck, a much loved member of the presbyterate of our Diocese of Broken Bay passed away on Thursday, 9 September at his home.

We extend our heartfelt condolences to Paul, Fr Jim's brother who is resident at St Catherine's, Marsfield and to his wider family. Fr Jim was a remarkable presence in our Diocese, participating with great generosity in the life of the presbyterate right through to his death and maintaining an active ministry throughout his retirement supporting our priests by his gracious availability for supply.

Fr Jim was born on 15 December 1933 in Junee, NSW to Francis George Duck and Linda Josephine Duck. He attended primary school at both St Joseph's Convent, Junee (1939 - 1940) and Our Lady of Lourdes Convent, Eastwood (1940 - 1942) and secondary school at De La Salle College, Marrickville (1943 - 1948) and St Columba's Springwood (1949 - 1950).

Fr Jim's seminary studies were at St Columba's College, Springwood (1951 - 1952) and then St Patrick's College, Manly (1953 - 1957). He was ordained on 20 July 1957 at St Mary's Cathedral, Sydney by Cardinal Gilroy.

Prior to the establishment of our Diocese of Broken Bay in 1986, Fr Jim served in the following appointments:

Assistant Priest	Rozelle Parish	31 January 1976 to 7 February 1977

Fr James' first appointment as a Parish Priest was to Gosford Parish on 8 February 1977, a position he held when the Diocese of Broken Bay was established in 1986 until 29 February 1988. He then became the Chaplain to the Military Ordinariate being posted to Moorebank, Kapooka and Puckapunyal between April 1988 to December 1993. Upon Fr James' return to the Diocese he was appointed the Parish Priest of Narrabeen Parish on 1 February 1994 and remained there until his retirement from active ministry on 3 November 1999. In retirement, Fr James lived independently at his home in North Ryde.

Fr James celebrated his 87th Birthday in December 2020 and on the 20 July 2021 celebrated his 64th Anniversary of Ordination to Catholic priesthood.

We give God thanks for Fr James Duck's long and fruitful ministry as a priest, and now commend him to Almighty God, "Eternal rest grant unto him, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon him."

I ask that all our priests offer Mass for the repose of the soul of Fr James and that we all remember him and his family in their prayers.

Details of Fr Jim's funeral arrangements will be shared early next week.

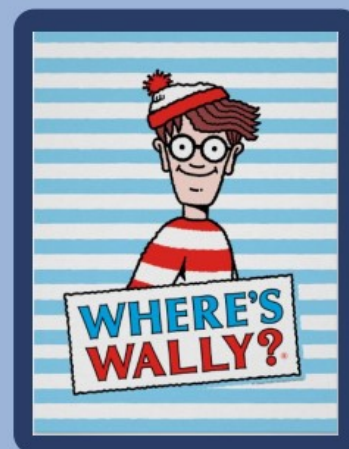

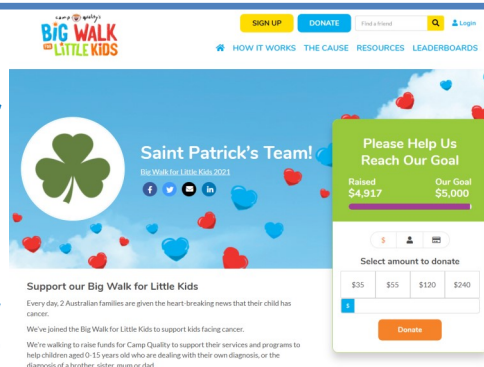
